Building Futures Programme

Building Futures is a two week QCF accredited (gualifications and credit framework) vocational construction training programme, which Wates Group delivers in partnership with Ixion Holdings. The course is for anyone 19 and over living locally, unemployed and looking for a career in construction.

Included within the course is: Health & Safety, asbestos awareness, carpentry/multi-trade skills, manual handling, CV workshop, interview skills and CSCS test to obtain a CSCS card.

A Building Futures course was held for Braywick Leisure Centre at Larchfield Community Centre in Maidenhead and was attended by 17 local candidates who visited the site for a tour and a presentation about the project. One of the candidates is now working as the Gateman for the Braywick site.

CCS Hoarding Competition and School Visit

The Braywick Leisure Centre site team invited year 5 and 6 pupils from two local primary schools, LowbrookAcademy and Holy Trinity C of E Primary School to do paintings for the hoarding as an entry for the CCS national Hoarding Competition. They were given the theme of sport and performing arts.

Once the paintings were displayed on the hoarding, the site team invited 150 pupils from both schools to view their artwork.

Cllr Samantha Rayner attended the visit and awarded prizes for the best pictures, along with the CCS mascot HonorGoodsite.

The children were then able to go and view the site and given a talk about what was being built and ask questions.

Lowbrook Academy Assembly

The Braywick Leisure Centre site team were invited to Lowbrook Academy School to do an assembly about building the leisure centre. This took place after the students had visited the site to view their paintings on the hoarding.

The children were all extremely interested in the new leisure centre and having already visited asked lots of good guestions and were keen to learn about the impact on the wild life.





Construction course helps transform maidenhead man's life

A jobseeker in Maidenhead has turned his life around thanks to Wates Construction, the contractor building the new Braywick Leisure Centre, securing his first ever job following a free training scheme for the long-term unemployed.

Upon completion of Wates' accredited Building Futures programme, in which candidates aged 19+ are provided with two weeks' construction training, Breaze Roberts (26) was one of two participants invited to work with Wates full time. Prior to taking part in the course, Breaze had yet to find a job, having spent his late teens and early twenties getting into trouble with the police. A lack of confidence had proved a barrier to meeting people and learning new skills but after meeting course organisers, Ixion at the local JobCentre, Breaze decided it was time for a fresh start. He commented: "I was very apprehensive about starting the course and the first day was tough but my advice to anyone starting out on the Building Futures programme is to stick it out – it has definitely changed my life for the better."
